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1. India Secures LNG Supplies Till September Amid West Asian Conflict

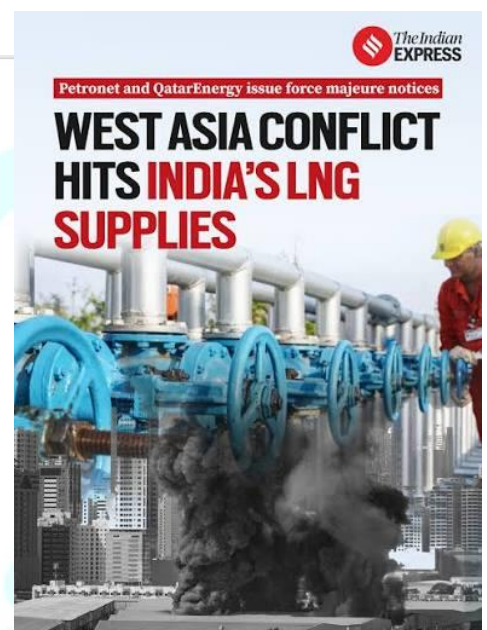

2. India Fiscal Deficit Reaches 18.2% Of Target Amid Rising Government Spending

- India's fiscal deficit reached 18.2% of the full-year budget estimate at ₹3.08 trillion by the end of June, rising marginally from 17.9% in the corresponding period of the previous year.
- Total government expenditure stood at ₹13.57 trillion during the first quarter, accounting for 25.4% of the annual budget estimate, driven by robust capital expenditure growth of 23.7% to reach ₹3.4 trillion.
- Total receipts hit ₹10.49 trillion, comprising ₹6.37 trillion in net tax revenue and ₹3.78 trillion in non-tax revenue bolstered by the Reserve Bank of India's record dividend payout of ₹2.87 trillion.
- Sectoral tax collections showed uneven trends, with direct taxes and corporate income tax performing buoyantly while indirect taxes and GST collections experienced contractions.
- Economists view the current fiscal trajectory as comfortable and manageable, projecting that anticipated tax inflows and robust infrastructure spending in railways and defense will keep the full-year fiscal deficit target of 4.3% of GDP on track.

- Environmentalists and experts highlight that unchecked urban sprawl and structural cutting of Aravalli ranges degrade regional ecology, compromise natural drainage systems, and aggravate microclimate vulnerabilities.

8. Severe Sewage Contamination Detected Near Bhopal Gas Tragedy Site

- Activists and local residents in Bhopal have alleged that 68% of drinking water samples collected from areas surrounding the defunct Union Carbide factory are severely contaminated with faecal coliform.
- Out of 63 tap water samples gathered across 30 localities between July 2 and July 22, 43 samples tested positive for sewage contamination, raising critical public health concerns.
- Activists noted that 19 out of 30 surveyed communities face active sewage contamination in their municipal water lines, echoing recent urban water safety crises like Indore's Bhagirathpura tragedy.
- Comparative tests revealed that 90% of water samples from Bhopal's upper lake and 25% of samples from Kolar dam also displayed contamination markers, whereas Narmada river samples tested negative.
- The Bhopal Municipal Corporation (BMC) has strongly contested these findings, asserting that its own internal water testing of 61 samples conducted in July revealed no such impurities.

- **Article 25 of the Constitution:** Guarantees freedom of conscience and the right freely to profess, practice, and propagate religion, subject to public order, morality, and health.
- **Article 44 of the Constitution:** Directs the State to endeavor to secure for citizens a Uniform Civil Code throughout the territory of India as a Directive Principle of State Policy.
- **Section 82 of Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS):** Criminalizes bigamy, punishing individuals who marry again during the lifetime of a husband or wife, historically subject to exemptions under certain personal laws.

Conclusion

The Supreme Court's notice on the legality of polygamy marks a critical milestone in India's ongoing legal journey toward harmonizing religious personal laws with constitutional guarantees of gender equality. Striking down discriminatory practices is essential to uphold women's dignity and advance the objective of a uniform, equitable legal framework.
