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1. Deep-Tech RDI Fund Approvals and Conflict of Interest Concerns

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Initial Disbursement Cleared:** The Investment Committee of the Technology Development Board (TDB) approved Rs 2,192 crore in soft loans for 22 private firms under the newly established Research, Development and Innovation (RDI) Fund.
- **Conflict of Interest Allegations:** Media investigations revealed that 15 of the 22 selected firms have financial or investment links to seven members of the 12-member selection panel, accounting for 62% (Rs 1,377 crore) of the total cleared funds.
- **Selection Panel Defense:** Panel members affirmed that personal and professional interests were formally disclosed and they recused themselves from discussions involving linked entities during evaluation rounds.
- **Demands for Governance Guardrails:** Parliamentarians and policy experts flagged concerns over potential bias, emphasizing the necessity for stringent public accountability mechanisms when deploying public capital to private ventures.
- **Corpus & Administration:** The RDI Fund operates as a Special Purpose Fund with a total corpus of Rs 1 lakh crore under the statutory Anusandhan National Research Foundation (ANRF) to provide low-cost, collateral-free loans for private R&D.
- **Strategic Sector Focus:** Funding targets high-impact, cutting-edge technologies including space science, semiconductors, quantum computing, digital healthcare, advanced manufacturing, and clean energy.

Implementing robust third-party oversight, mandatory public disclosure logs, and blind evaluation protocols will be vital to preserving public trust in state-led innovation funding.

2. Low Utilization of Good Samaritan (Rah-Veer) Scheme Amid Rising Road Fatalities

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Low Scheme Utilization:** Ministry of Road Transport and Highways (MoRTH) data tabled in Parliament shows only 813 people were awarded under the Rah-Veer Scheme across five years (FY2021-22 to FY2025-26) despite climbing road accidents.
- **Geographical Disparity:** Scheme adoption was restricted to 15 States and 2 UTs; major high-fatality states like Maharashtra and Karnataka recorded zero takers, while Rajasthan topped with 224 awardees followed by Bihar (95).
- **Bystander Hesitation:** Severe under-utilization stems from persistent bystander apprehension regarding police harassment, institutional paperwork, and judicial follow-ups.
- **Impact on Trauma Mortality:** As per a NITI Aayog-AIIMS report, nearly 30% of trauma-related fatalities in India occur due to delays in emergency medical intervention.
- **Incentive Revision:** MoRTH extended the scheme for another five years, increasing the reward amount to Rs 25,000 (up from Rs 5,000) and allocating an initial grant of Rs 25 lakh per state.
- **Grievance Redressal Deficit:** Despite a 2016 Supreme Court ruling directing states to set up Good Samaritan grievance redressal frameworks, only two high-fatality states have complied.

3. Kerala's "My Police Station" Initiative for Democratic Police Reforms

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Launch of Comprehensive Reform:** The Kerala government announced the "My Police Station" project, launching on August 15, to enhance public accessibility, accountability, and democratic policing.
- **Shift in Station House Officers (SHOs):** Sub-Inspectors (SIs) will take charge as SHOs in 419 out of 484 law-and-order police stations, reversing the earlier practice of appointing Circle Inspectors (CIs).

- **Gender Inclusivity:** Women Sub-Inspectors will head operations as SHOs across 63 police stations statewide.
- **Strategic Command Distribution:** CIs will remain SHOs in 64 strategically significant stations, while a Deputy Superintendent of Police (DySP) will head the Mullaperiyar dam police station.
- **Eradication of Custodial Crimes:** A core objective is the complete elimination of third-degree methods, custodial violence, and custodial deaths through structured orientation training.
- **Independent Oversight Mechanism:** Range DIGs will gather monthly feedback from stations, overseen by the ADGP (Law and Order) and the State Police Chief.

4. Cabinet Approves Rs 23,731 Crore 'GOBARdhan' Scheme to Boost Biogas Production

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Outlay & Timeline:** The Union Cabinet approved 'GOBARdhan', the National Circular Bioenergy Scheme, with a financial outlay of Rs 23,731 crore for ten years (2026-27 to 2035-36).
- **Production Targets:** The scheme aims to increase domestic Compressed Bio-Gas (CBG) production nearly 10-fold between 2026 and 2036, attracting large-scale private investment.
- **Import Dependence:** Boosting domestic CBG production will help reduce India's import reliance, which currently meets about half of the nation's natural gas demand, while cushioning against supply shocks like the Strait of Hormuz crisis.
- **Mandatory Blending Targets:** City Gas Distribution (CGD) entities will meet phased CBG blending obligations: 3% in 2026-27, 4% in 2027-28, and 5% from 2028-29 onwards in PNG and CNG networks.
- **Pricing & Offtake Support:** Introduces a stable administered CBG price floor of Rs 2,110 per MMBTU and guaranteed off-take frameworks to secure long-term revenue visibility for producers.
- **Financial Assistance:** Greenfield CBG projects will receive capital assistance of up to Rs 2 crore per tonne per day of installed capacity, extending support to feedstock aggregation assets and organic manure processing.

5. Debunking Ethanol Blending Claims in Aviation Turbine Fuel: Distinction Between Ethanol and SAF

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Official Refutation:** Union Civil Aviation Minister Ram Mohan Naidu explicitly dismissed claims regarding government plans to blend ethanol with Aviation Turbine Fuel (ATF), calling the assertions false and irresponsible.
- **Technical Distinction:** The Ministry clarified that ethanol and Sustainable Aviation Fuel (SAF) are entirely different clean fuels and should not be conflated in public or policy discussions.
- **Global Certification Standards:** Highlighted that SAF is an internationally certified aviation fuel recognized by the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) and adopted globally.
- **Rigorous Safety Testing:** Emphasized that SAF undergoes rigorous testing and meets stringent international safety standards before approval for aircraft engine integration.
- **Deterring Misinformation:** Warned that spreading unverified reports regarding aviation fuel safety creates unwarranted anxiety among air travelers.

- **Passenger Safety Priority:** Reaffirmed that passenger safety and operational integrity remain the highest priority for the Ministry of Civil Aviation during energy transitions.

6. CAG Audit Flags Irregularities in West Bengal Paddy Procurement

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Transport Irregularities Flagged:** A Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG) audit report revealed that over 4,200 quintals of paddy were falsely recorded as transported via ambulances, passenger auto-rickshaws, buses, and luxury cabs during the 2020–21 Kharif Marketing Season.

- **Unregistered and Untraceable Vehicles:** The audit found 19 vehicles engaged in transporting 4,211.89 quintals of paddy that were either not registered for goods carriage or untraceable on the Ministry of Road Transport and Highways (MoRTH) portal.
- **Duplicate Procurement Entries:** At a Central Procurement Centre in Singur, Hooghly, 59 repeated entries were made under 10 individuals—including owners of two rice mills—procuring 2,568.13 quintals worth Rs 44.94 lakh.
- **Exploitation of Bank Accounts:** Subsequent inquiry uncovered 97 additional fake entries involving 3,893.71 quintals where individuals shared bank details with mill owners without actually selling any paddy.
- **Lax Penalties and Repeat Participation:** Though penalties totaling Rs 52.32 lakh were imposed on offending mills, they were allowed to participate in subsequent procurement seasons merely by submitting undertakings.
- **Deprivation of Small Farmers:** The CAG noted that ghost procurement and rice mill collusion undermined the Minimum Support Price (MSP) mechanism, depriving small and marginal farmers of intended financial benefits.

The audit findings highlight critical governance gaps, software loopholes, and collusion in state paddy procurement systems. Ensuring robust digital authentication, strict vehicle verification, and severe legal sanctions against offending millers are necessary to restore integrity to public distribution systems and protect farmer welfare.

7. Parliamentary Authority over SC/ST Creamy Layer Exclusion: Centre's Stand in Supreme Court

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Exclusive Legislative Prerogative:** In a counter-affidavit filed before the Supreme Court, the Union Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment affirmed that extending the 'creamy layer' principle to Scheduled Castes (SCs) and Scheduled Tribes (STs) falls under the exclusive domain of Parliament.
- **Separation of Powers:** The Centre urged the Judiciary to refrain from directing the Executive to frame policies on income-based sub-quotas without empirical data or explicit legislative mandate, citing institutional separation of powers.
- **Historical & Social Criteria:** The government highlighted that reservation for SCs and STs is grounded in historical backwardness, untouchability, and geographical isolation rather than purely economic status.
- **Non-Applicability of Creamy Layer:** Citing the Constitution Bench ruling in *Ashoka Kumar Thakur v. Union of India (2008)*, the affidavit contended that the creamy layer concept was developed exclusively for OBC reservations and does not apply to SCs/STs.
- **Inapplicability of Mandamus:** Any modification to affirmative action policies must be preceded by holistic reviews and socio-economic empirical studies rather than judicial directions.
- **Precedent Support:** The Centre referenced *E.V. Chinnaiah v. State of Andhra Pradesh (2005)*, emphasizing that Parliament alone possesses the authority to alter presidential lists under Articles 341 and 342.

- **Creamy Layer Principle:** An economic criteria-based threshold used to exclude socially advanced or affluent individuals within backward classes from receiving reservation benefits.

 - ***Ashoka Kumar Thakur v. Union of India (2008)*:** Affirmed that the creamy layer exclusion cannot be automatically extended to SC/ST categories.
 - ***State of Punjab v. Davinder Singh (2024)*:** Recognized state competency to sub-categorize SCs/STs for equitable access without equating it to automatic creamy layer exclusion.

Conclusion

The Centre's stand before the Supreme Court reinforces the principle that fundamental alterations to reservation structures require legislative deliberation and empirical backing. Safeguarding Parliament's statutory competence under Article 341 balances affirmative action with constitutional separation of powers.

8. Institutional In-fighting in Himachal Pradesh Police and Administrative Governance Issues

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Public Spat Among Senior IPS Officers:** An escalating dispute between top Himachal Pradesh police officers—including officiating DGP Ashok Tewari, DIG Sanjeev Gandhi, and Shimla SP Gaurav Singh—began over official bungalow retention and escalated into mutual allegations.
- **Special Financial Audit Ordered:** Following delays in vacating government housing, the DGP constituted a three-member committee to audit Rs 14.07 lakh spent on maintenance works at the designated residence between 2022 and 2025.

- **Allegations of Fund Misappropriation:** The audit examined whether funds meant for district police residential accounts and road safety maintenance were redirected towards residential upkeep.
- **Counter-Allegations Regarding Road Safety Procurement:** DIG Sanjeev Gandhi submitted a report alleging procedural irregularities in equipment procurement funded under the HP Road Safety Fund.
- **Public Airing of Internal Disputes:** The escalation led former senior officials and administrative heads to publicly voice concern over the collapse of internal discipline, command structure, and institutional authority.
- **Government Intervention and Disciplinary Action:** The Home Department noted the breach of service conduct rules, emphasizing that public squabbling among security leadership severely undermines public confidence during administrative crises.

Public disputes among senior police officers undermine institutional credibility, operational efficiency, and the chain of command. Upholding administrative discipline through service conduct rules, transparent housing allotment policies, and independent audit mechanisms is vital for preserving public trust in law enforcement authorities.

- **Data-Dependent Approach:** The central bank maintains growth-supportive liquidity, treating food-driven supply-side price pressures as temporary unless inflation becomes broad-based.

12. Impact of Supreme Court Order on Mining Operations Near Ramsar Wetland Sites

- **Milestone in Ramsar Tally:** India's Ramsar sites reached 101 with the addition of Glaw Lake (Arunachal Pradesh's first Ramsar site), making India the country with the highest number of Ramsar sites in Asia.
- **Regulatory Shift Under 2017 Rules:** The Wetlands (Conservation and Management) Rules, 2017



decentralized regulation to State Wetland Authorities but removed the explicit prohibition list found under the 2010 Rules, a framework currently under constitutional challenge in the apex court.

- **Divergent Mining Norms:** Absolute mining prohibitions exist within national parks and wildlife sanctuaries alongside a mandated 1 km Eco-Sensitive Zone (ESZ) buffer, whereas mining near wetlands previously lacked uniform statutory buffer distances.
